


The beginning of the end

So what is Vimy Ridge?



- 7km long ridge next to tiny town called Vimy(pop ~4700)
- WWI turning point battle
- Defining moment in Canadian history


Trench war



 Reconstructed trenches...in June

- On the surface the war was at a standstill
- "Live and let live" philosophy
- But underground...

Tunnel war



- Dig tunnels under each other and then place explosives there to collapse the enemy's tunnels
- Try to intercept signals from eachother in the tunnels

The Battle



April 9th 1917


- Germans had this ridge for a long time
- Can see all the way to Belgium from it
- New strategies by Canadians enabled us to win it!
- Paved the way for Battle of Arras

The Techniques



- Aerial pictures:
 - Ballooons were sent into the air with baskets full of men and photographic equipment
- Resulted in good sense of what's going on in battle

The Techniques



- Sound ranging :
 - Microphones in No Mans Land allowed engineers to pinpoint enemy guns in less than 5 minuites and within 28 yards
- Pioneered by engineering prof from McGill
- British Army didn't want to listen at first...

The Tactics



- Private funding meant Canadians had more guns than the British
- Lieutenant-Colonel Raymond Brutinel convinced his rich friends to fund the 1st Canadian Machine Gun Brigade

The Tactics



- Practice trenches, battleground miniatures and maps:
 - Usually maps are for officers only, this time maps were given to every soldier and each one knew his objective
 - Extensive training done

We got the land and a huge monument




..and I mean HUUUGGEE!

Represents a young nation mourning its dead sons


Casualties

 "At Vimy, the Canadian Corps had captured more ground, more prisoners and more guns than any previous British offensive in two-anda-half years of war"



Why do we care?

- From 1914-1918 the population of Canada was roughly 8,000,000
- Roughly 600,000
 men and women
 had enlisted by the
 end
- That's almost 10%!!



Why do we care?



- Defining moment in Canadian history
- We even got our own separate signature on the Versailles Peace Treaty!
